Module Aims

This module builds on the skills developed during introductory microeconomics (AFE4010-B), introducing students to advanced models in microeconomics and illustrating these with examples from the real world.

Outline Syllabus

Consumer theory; equilibrium, utility maximisation, price elasticity and theory of demand.

Producer theory: production functions, firm's cost curves and profit maximisation.

Behaviour of firms in different market forms: perfect competition, monopoly, monopolistic competition oligopoly and game theory.

General equilibrium and welfare analysis: market failure, externalities, Coase theorem and public goods.
