Module Aims

The aim of this module is to build on learning from Transition to Midwifery Knowledge and deepen your underpinning knowledge and understanding of the care provided to women and newborns throughout the childbearing continuum.

The module provides the opportunity for you to build insight and understanding of the factors that contribute to the quality and safety of maternity services and support sustainable midwifery practice for women, neonates, and families with additional or complex care needs. You will explore the role of interprofessional communication, information sharing, and leadership within the public health agenda, including the use of digital technologies, and develop a critical insight into the ethical dilemmas that impact on midwifery care and motherhood.

You will apply the knowledge and skills developed through this learning to their clinical practice within the year-long module 'Consolidating Midwifery Practice'.

Outline Syllabus

Institutional cultures, role of the media in maternity services, clinical governance, escalation, quality and safety in maternity care, collaborative working, critical thinking, and problem solving to facilitate complex care planning, optimising physiological and psychological processes, coordination of care, advocacy, cultural safety, trauma informed care, factors affecting mortality and morbidity childbearing women, global maternity systems and policy, epidemiology, public health and associated inequalities, legal and professional frameworks, ethical principles and theories including feminist ethics, intersectionality, national and global political and social drivers in maternity services, interprofessional communication skills, escalation, safety, digital technologies and literacy, leadership, problem solving, solution finding, self-efficacy, care outside recommended guidance/maternity services, autonomy, advocacy, PMA role.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Teaching and learning will be supported by a hybrid approach that utilises synchronous and asynchronous lectures and seminars to explore and develop theoretical knowledge, critical thinking and shared professional knowledge (LO1, LO2, LO3, LO4, LO5). Study skills will be embedded within the teaching of this module via timetabled sessions delivered by the academic skills team.

Problem based learning and flipped classroom activities will facilitate exploration and application of knowledge to the professional context and underpin the Consolidating Midwifery Knowledge 2 assessment strategy. Case studies, seminars and workshops will support the application of theory to practice and shared learning (1,2,3,4,5).

Digital literacy will be developed through production of an individually recorded audio-visual academic poster presentation. Formative feedback on summative work will be available from your personal academic tutor (PAT).

Directed learning will support consolidation of key concepts and provide additional formative support via peer feedback on your presentation to inform your summative presentation.
