Module Aims
<p>This module builds a portfolio of skills which are transferable across your degree and beyond whilst introducing you to the Department of Psychology at Bradford, including the academic staff and their research.</p> <p>In the skills based elements of this module you will be introduced to practical approaches and theories relevant to the psychology of learning. The module develops skills which are relevant to studying psychology and to employability such as developing a CV, team working, critically evaluating theories and debating topics in group settings. You will learn how to assess and reflect upon your own approaches to learning, about how to avoid plagiarism and the importance of referencing. Personal development planning will allow you to continuously reflect and record your achievements.</p> <p>Interwoven with these key elements will be an introduction to the Psychology team and their research areas and interests. This will allow you to become more informed about the Bradford experience and what makes Psychology at Bradford unique. You will also learn about the different schools of thought and research paradigms present within the broader research taking place within the Department.</p>

- Personal Development planning - keeping a record of achievements and linking this with personal reflection.
- Understanding the importance of research in terms of knowledge generation and learning.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Lectures will introduce relevant psychological concepts and academic research and will provide direction for independent reading (LO 3, 4, 5). Workshops build upon lecture material and will allow you to apply this directly in creating an action plan, a CV, debating and thinking critically about psychological concepts, learning how to reference (LO 2) and reflect on your own professional development (LO 6, 7, 8). In workshops you will work in small groups to encourage collaborative learning.

In semester 1 you will submit an assignment which includes a written summary of a research article on the psychology of learning, along with a reflective piece on your own 'learning profile'. (LO 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10)

At the end of semester 2 you will submit a research account suitable for the general public detailing one aspect of research within the Department of Psychology at Bradford. (LO 1, 2, 3, 5, 11)
